Australian Business Week and Work Experience

This week, 28 Year 10 students from Manly Selective Campus teamed up with students from each of the other College campuses to participate in the Australian Business Week, Enterprise Education Program. Students have been working in cross campus teams to establish a business plan and strategies to launch a business in the Consumer Electronics retail industry.

Teams have been required to determine the staffing levels and training requirements for their business, set salaries and incentives, manage such aspects as stock control, promotions, specials and discounts, manage cash flow, debtors and accounts along with promoting the business through advertising and special offers.

Each 'company' was mentored throughout the process by a supporting teacher as well as a volunteer business advisor from our local community.

Teams were judged on a range of set criteria, including a presentation of their business plans and promotional strategies to the entire audience of participants and mentors.

This is an invaluable learning experience for our students in which they develop their teamwork and negotiation skills along with the business acumen that goes with it.

Those of our Year 10 students not participating in ABW have been actively involved in Work Experience programs. Many of the students who have been coming in to visit school while on Work Experience have been very positive in their comments of the program they are participating in. This too is a fantastic opportunity for our students to learn about the careers that they are thinking of moving into upon finishing their studies – or even perhaps changing some minds about what they imagined a particular vocation may entail.

Congratulations to SRC

Our SRC have once again held a very successful *Toys & Tucker* charity drive. Our foyer area was overflowing with donations that will be distributed by various charities to needy families in the lead up to Christmas. This is an extremely beneficial program where our students can actively *give back to our community* through a relatively simple but very meaningful project.

The tournament involves robotics, innovation and teamwork. Accompanying staff member Mr Goykovic explained that the teamwork exhibited at the competition was exceptional and may have been the final deciding factor in their overall success. The assistance of parent helper Mr Carlo Manfredini and MSC staff member Mr Branko Goykovic are greatly appreciated in facilitating this opportunity for the students, in addition to working with them to prepare for the competition.

For the impromptu teamwork challenge, the team devised an idea for virtual classrooms accessed from the comfort of the school classroom where technology allowed an immersion experience for the learner. Timetable 2015

Planning the 2015 timetable is well underway. During Term 3, Year 10 students and parents were interviewed and subsequently finalised their choices based on subjects available in each line.

Year 7 students were asked to choose either French or Japanese for their Language study in Year 8. Due to class constraints, some students who had not returned their signed form by the due date may not have been given their first choice.

Students in Year 8 also made their elective choices online and this information was used to determine the lines for the three electives studied in Year 9 2015. Although some of the electives offered did not run, most students have been placed in their first choices electives and all students are in classes chosen as either first preferences or reserve choices. At first, we expected the experience to be rather serious and uptight – but we were soon corrected in this belief when the organisers stood up and told us to dance, and dance we did.

Afterwards, we were split up into separate groups and shipped off to different buildings around the university. These were also auditoriums, albeit significantly smaller, and we were organised into separate group rows within the area. The groups contained a large mix of schools, and most people did not have a single friend that they knew previously in their group. At first, this was rather confronting, but we found ourselves understanding each other as "fellow to-be leaders" and became friends very quickly.

We engaged in several different activities that developed our leadership skills in a creative manner. The experiences of adapting to different situations that were created for us with new people who we did not know, well served to help us discover our specific leadership qualities and make use of these in a different environment.

One of our favourite activities of the day was "How to Train your Dragon". We were told to elect a

'dragon' and teach them different 'movements' – but we were blocked by the obstacle of not being able to speak, and we were forced to develop new and old communication skills in order to overcome the challenge. The activity was both interesting and highly amusing and worked well in teaching us the impact of other forms of communication – gestures – and how these forms of communication can be important in the role of leadership.

At the end of the day, we had the privilege of listening to some incredibly inspiring talks by Holly Ransom and Stephanie Lorenzo, both of whom are successful leaders and speakers. "Know your why." "When you go, go big." "Who do you allow to influence you?" they told us about their amazing achievements in life, and taught us how they applied these various life ideals in order to be successful as a leader. Unfortunately, our session was cut short by time, but we were all in awe of the leaders before us. We left the Clancy Auditorium inspired to become better leaders - to know our "whys" and to bring positive influence to places in our world - to follow our ideals and choosing who can have an influence on our lives. It's an amazing experience that can change your views on life and leadership, as well as bring a change to how you act within the world.

Wireless Connectivity



Wireless Connectivity is key to BYOD in schools! Devices must support **Dual Band** wireless or 802.11 a/b/g/n. (Make sure it supports **5GHz**)



To ensure the latest programs and software are compatible, we recommend the current or previous version of any operating system. E.g. iOS 7 for iPads/iPods

Operating System



Battery Life Minimum 5hrs

Devices need to last the school day; we recommend a minimum of 5hrs battery life without recharging.



Minimum Storage & RAM 16 GB Storage 2 GB RAM (Tablets) 120 GB Storage 4 GB RAM (Laptops)

To be able to store and process data effectively these minimum specifications are recommended.

Hardware Features Keyboard, Camera & Microphone

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If using a tablet a keyboard will be necessary and a stylus may also be useful.



Ensure the screen is of a reasonable size to enable ease of use throughout a school day.

Other essential considerations

Casing: Needs to be tough and sturdy, can it be dropped without breaking?

Weight: Is the laptop light enough for your child to carry each day?

Durability: Consider the overall durability of the device, are the keys and inputs sturdy.



Screen Size

Minimum 10 inches



Accessories

Carry Case: A carry case or skin is essential in protecting your device and can provide ergonomic advantages.

Insurance: Devices can become lost or be broken easily at school, make sure your policy covers these eventualities.

Warranty: Make sure you consider purchasing extra warranty to reduce future repair costs as these devices will be used extensively.

Wi-Fi Connectivity

Wireless operates on two bands 2.4GHz and 5GHz. The DEC Wi-Fi officially supports 5 GHz. Devices must support <u>Dual Band</u> wireless.

Warranty

Make sure you consider purchasing extra warranty to reduce future repair costs as these devices will be used extensively. Consider 3-year extanded warranty.

Anti-virus Programs

As part of the NSW DEC BYOD Policy an active antivirus application is required. Free programs are available.

Windows 7 Operating Systems - *Microsoft Security Essentials*, free download Windows 8 Operating Systems - *Windows Defender*, built-in to the OS



Software Partners

All NSW Department of Education and Communities students are eligible to download and licence free Adobe and Microsoft software from this website. This software is only available to download onto personally owned devices.

Students will need to use their @education.nsw.gov.au student email address to register on their first visit. To register, click on the "Sign In" link at the top of the page and then click on the REGISTER button. A verification email will be sent to your DEC email address. To complete the registration please select the link provided in the email.
