From the Principal

Welcome Back

I would like to welcome everybody back to Term 4. To this stage, we have had a magnificent year and we can only hope that that will continue. Every day we are so fortunate to be able to work with such dedicated, focussed students who live the ethos of our school: *personal best, academic excellence and giving back to the community*.

We say it every term, but this will be another busy term for students and staff. Within classes, students will be moving towards final assessment of their learning. We also have students continuing in debating and public speaking competitions, our bands have a number of performances, there will be drama, dance and vocal ensemble performances and a number of our students will participate in the Department of Education, *Schools Spectacular*. In addition, students will be auditioning for inclusion in a variety of regional and state ensembles for bands and drama.

Our new fitness centre is progressing, having been painted during the holidays and the floor covering being delivered this week. All equipment has now been sourced and ordered, so this centre should be operable before the end of the year. Much of this has come to fruition through the efforts of Mr Blanch, but thanks also must be extended to all in our community, students, parents and staff, for their ongoing support and enthusiasm.

HSC Begins

This week our Year 12 students began their HSC examinations. It was wonderful to see them back as a group on Thursday morning, eager to begin the first of their English papers. In speaking with students after that first paper, most were more than happy with it and relieved that the examinations were finally underway. On

Thursday, our Music students also had their examination in the afternoon, while today students completed the second of the English papers and the Hospitality (VET) exam.

The HSC examinations continue until Friday 4 November with the last of the examinations, Design and Technology finishing at 2:30pm.

At this early stage, I would like to pass on my thanks to the remainder of our students for the consideration that they have shown to our Year 12s in ensuring that noise is kept to a minimum around the school, giving them every opportunity to complete examinations under the most favourable conditions possible.

Student/Parent Information Evening

As one group of Year 12 students are exiting our school, another is beginning their final journey to the HSC. On Tuesday evening, we hosted an Information Evening for the parents and students of our 2017 graduating class. Information was given in relation to Board of Studies, Teaching and Educational Standards (BOSTES) requirements for the HSC as well as the range of support services available at the school for students and their families as they progress through the HSC year. Of particular note on the evening was a presentation by Mrs Jacqui Pollock, a former parent of the school whose daughter completed the HSC in 2015, who spoke to the audience on the *Parent as Coach* approach to surviving the HSC.

We look forward to conducting similar sessions throughout the course of the HSC year, including a session where former students speak in relation to their journey through the HSC, university and into the work force.

New Parking Restrictions Near School

We were recently notified by the Northern Beaches Council that they will be implementing

new restrictions to parking and vehicle movement around the area of the school. The Roads and Maritime Services now allow the use of yellow lines to designate No Stopping zones. In the coming weeks, yellow lines will be installed on the intersection of Barilla Avenue and Abbott Road. This continuous yellow line will be painted along the kerb. This designates no stopping, even if there isn't a No Stopping sign in the vicinity.

We urge students and parents to be aware of these changes. Later in this bulletin you will find notices from Council regarding these changes and what the changes will look like on the kerbs.

Kim Berendes Scholarship Criteria

This \$5000 scholarship is awarded to a female graduate of Manly Selective Campus who is enrolled in a course of tertiary study leading to a career or community activity which promotes social justice.

Core values of integrity, strength and compassion will be reflected in all applications.

Applicants can study social work, environmental studies, nursing, education, law or any other discipline which has social equity as one of its core themes.

The successful applicant will be officially presented with their scholarship at the School Presentation Night Ceremony in the year following their graduation. Payment will be made upon confirmation of enrolment in their tertiary study.

All applications will be assessed by a panel including the benefactor, the principal and a parent representative.

Ongoing reporting and association with the school is expected

Kim Berendes

Kim Berendes was born in 1923. She was a child of the Depression, and at the age of thirteen began full-time work to help support her single mother. She worked for much of her life as a public servant, mostly for the New South Wales police. However Kim valued education highly. After leaving school she set out to educate herself further, and continued to do so for the rest of her life.

When her husband Rolf was diagnosed, as a young man, with multiple sclerosis, Kim looked after him devotedly for the rest of his life.

Kim had a passion for Manly, where she lived for nearly sixty years. She took a lively interest in local politics, and worked for the local art gallery and residents' association. She was generous to causes in which she believed, to her community.

Kim Berendes died in early 2009. The Scholarship for Social Justice which bears her name is intended to encourage and provide financial support for young women who share the qualities which characterised Kim's life:
integrity, strength and compassion.

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FROM THE ARCHIVES

It's thought provoking to contrast and compare social mores over the decades. In our continuing articles from previous Pines Magazines, we bring you some extracts of interest. This is the Headmaster's Message from 1964 (the era of The Beatles and the Vietnam War).

It has been said that in the days of Socrates young men were contemptuous of authority, lacking respect for their elders and were a cause of anxiety to their parents. Socrates himself was found guilty of helping, by his teaching, to bring about their corruption.

Both old and New Testaments give frequent reference to the prototypes of the problem youth of today.

In the fourteenth century, beating, murder and robbery by violence were commonplace.

In the eighteenth century sporadic outbreaks of rioting gangs consisting of gentlemen of leisure called 'Mohocks', used to attack the watchmen of the day, 'Charlies', as they were named.

The novelist, Henry Fielding, who as a magistrate, held court over such gangs, from his experiences published his 'Enquiry into the Cause of the late Increase of Robbers'; the result of the publication of this enquiry was the appointment of the first six thief-takers, the remote ancestors of Metropolitan Police.

This delinquency among youth was common enough from very early times. Only one hundred years ago street gangs in New York would leave their dead behind them after savage street battles. Here in Sydney just forty years ago razor gangs for a while had the upper hand. Delinquency of today is by comparison almost innocuous.

Other than some few who are criminally minded, there are others, again only a few, who are disdainful of authority and guilty of gross indiscipline.

It is in periods of post-war reorganization and in times of threat of war that people find a reason for their resurgent criticism of ebullient youth. For it is true that young people do mirror the insecurity which they sense in their parents and in others; they look for guidance but no longer find it as their parents did: they feel unwanted and unloved and they become refractory.

The social changes following this half century of war make it difficult for our young people to determine what is good conduct and what is bad. The bond of the family and of the home is not as strong now as it was then; the location of the child's activity has become, by new forms of travel, so very extensive too.

Industry geared to phenomenal peace-time production, finds new markets in our working youth, who spend annually more than £400,000,000 and spend it in what way they wish. No wonder some of our pupils at school try to imitate their way of dress, their appearance and their conduct; but such attempts to emulate those young ones who are earning must be restrained. Distractions caused by casual or fancy dress harm the discipline of school. A school pupil who apes the fashion of dress of those who have left and so appears different from his schoolmates in uniform is, in very fact, a snob. When he wears expensive trousers, unusual shoes and costly shaggy pullover (and his hair is shaggy too), this is the inverted form of snobbery. He vaunts himself knowing he has spent much more than a uniform would cost. He has managed to become so very different. The purpose of the school uniform is to prevent snobbishness. Care in appearance and dress and loyalty to school rules are a training for future citizenship. No school should produce snobs.

Deviations from the accepted standards of good conduct and appearance do occur, but must be corrected. When such deviations receive the floodlight of publicity, as they do now, such publicity is harmful both to the pupil and to the development of good conduct in our schools.

The many forms of publicity, so influential and so directed to misrepresentation in words, by omission, evasion or misplaced emphasis, can do great harm to the cause of youth, the cause to which thousands of our best citizens are dedicated. Why should the activity of some few delinquents receive full publicity, causing other few such types to envy them their notoriety and to seek to get into the spotlight too?

Why not leave people happy in the 97% of our youth who are, in the main, wholesome, clean-living, well-intentioned beings, conforming in dress and appearance, eager to do home study, to give close attention in class, to be punctual and regular in attendance, to be interested in general school activities, sport, music, art, drama and physical education as well as the academic subjects of his own choice. Each of these interests gives the pupil plenty of opportunity to express his

own individuality to the full; and if he expresses it in a number of these directions he deserves the success which is his due. On leaving school he will be his own agent for publicity for 'that which is good' and he will pass on to others the results of his success, for his school motto suggests his future sharing of the results of school endeavour.
