From the Principal

Selective High Schools Principal Conference

This week, I have been in attendance at the NSW Selective High Schools Principal's Conference. During this year's conference, we had the opportunity to give initial feedback into the review of the Department of Education Gifted and Talented Education policy and procedure documents. This review will take place during 2017, however, at the conference we were given time to annotate various aspects of the policies and procedures so that initial directions of the review could be developed. We look forward to the opportunity of providing further input to this review.

In addition to this, we heard from doctoral research student, Ruth Phillips and some of the findings of her research into underachieving gifted students. Much of what was presented by Ms Phillips resonated strongly amongst each of the Principals in attendance, each admitting that we have seen many of the traits presented in our own schools. Our undertaking being, that once these students have been identified, to differentiate the curriculum sufficiently to support their needs.

Dr Jane Hunter, who has worked closely with some of our students and staff in her work on Technology and the High Possibility Classroom (HPC), presented ideas for the practical applications of the concepts of HPCs, particularly in relation to STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) education and in Project Based Learning. Part of Dr Hunter's presentation was focused on the work that she had done in our very own school which contributed to our decision to implement strategies for authentic, cross curricular project learning into our Stage 4 classes.

Mr Jeff Bruce, a former Director, Public Schools NSW presented details on how Principals can best support staff in our schools to gain Board of Teaching and Educational Standards (BOSTES) accreditation at the levels of Higher Ability and Lead teacher. This session was very valuable as we have a number of staff at Manly Campus seeking these higher levels of accreditation.

Ms Hayley Russell from the Department of Education Futures Learning Unit challenged Principals to engage in a *Design Thinking* process to support the learning and teaching needs of students and staff in schools. We were urged to explore the impact of spaces on learning, to identify different ways of learning, investigate a range of learning spaces and develop a plan for redesigning spaces within our own educational settings. Again, we have moved along this way to some extent with the support of our P&C Association who assisted in the refurbishment of one of our learning spaces through the Innovation Grant in 2015.

This again was a truly valuable learning experience for each of the Principals in attendance and provided us with challenges to further improve the learning opportunities for the students in our schools.

Year 7 Debaters Support Northern Sydney Primary School Representative Teams

Once again this year, our students have been invited to support the learning of students in primary schools by working with the coaches of the Northern Sydney Region Primary Schools Debating Teams. On Tuesday, Year 7 students Jack Li, Jamie Palangio, Bea McGuire and Vivienne Paduch spent much of the day at Manly Vale Primary School participating in workshops with the primary school students and their coaches before participating in a debate with the younger students.

Presenting the affirmative case in a debate on whether or not extra-curricular programs play an important role in schools, our students won a closely contested debate in front of a large audience at Manly Vale Primary.

We are very proud to support the Primary Schools Debating Program and will send further Year 7 teams in the coming two weeks.

Year 8 Students Support Bushlink Program

For many years now, our school has supported the Northside Enterprises, *Bushlink* program. This program employs adults with an intellectual disability to carry out environmental projects with a focus on bush regeneration, gardening and grounds maintenance work. Much of the work that *Bushlink* has performed in our school has been in the area at the back of our playing field and relates to the regeneration of the bushland to its natural habitat. They have also worked at maintaining the garden area along the front of our hall and in planting native seedlings in the garden areas in the main quad.

On Monday, we had approximately 25 Year 8 students volunteer to work with the *Bushlink* staff at various times throughout the day in the bush regeneration area. The next group of 25 Year 8 students will assist on Monday 7 November. This is a wonderful opportunity for our students to provide additional support for *Bushlink* and work closely with an outstanding group of young men and women. This will now be an ongoing commitment of our Year 8 *giving back to the community* program to provide real and meaningful assistance to this innovative employment model.

Senior Jazz Ensemble

Congratulations to our senior Jazz Ensemble who had the pleasure of being invited to perform at a charity event hosted by Mrs Kerry Baird the wife of NSW Premier, Mr Mike Baird MP, at the Manly Pacific Hotel on Tuesday. This was a great honour for our students and is testament to the quality of this ensemble. With the HSC in progress, many of our Year 12 students who would normally perform in this ensemble were unavailable, however, it was wonderful to see former student Isaac Arnold return, giving of his time to support the group.

On Monday we were fortunate to have Professor Gordian Fulde speak to our Year 9 students about the effects of alcohol and drugs. Within minutes you can sense that he has a real passion, not only for emergency medicine, but for empowering and encouraging young people to make healthy choices. In PDHPE, Year 9 students will be developing a Health Promotion Campaign to encourage young people to make wise decisions about drug use. Students had the opportunity to ask Professor Fulde questions to help them develop this campaign.

Last night I had the pleasure of listening to the Year 9 Elective Music students perform Jazz pieces for their final assessment task. The talent, ability and confidence of these students were most impressive. Congratulations to all performers and to Ms Leviton for her organisation of such an enjoyable evening and wonderful opportunity for the students to perform to an authentic audience as part of their assessment.

It was the last PAL (Peer Academic Leaders) session this week. Year 7 students presented a 2 minute reflection on what they had learnt and how they have applied this knowledge at school. Students spoke about how they have implemented time management skills, beaten procrastination, used chunking and set goals. HSIE Report Term 4

In the last fortnight, the faculty has had excursions for HSC classes in both Economics and Society & Culture and concluded the ASX Schools Sharemarket Game.

The Economics students made their way to the NSW Treasury last week, where they heard from a number of economists on a range of topics including:

- the role of economics in government policy
- the importance of environmental and social issues in economies
- the NSW budget
- household and labour market trends, and
- the application of economics to human behaviour.

To conclude the day, students then visited the Reserve Bank of Australia to hear about the applications of monetary policy and the evolution of Australian currency. Overall, the day's activities provided a good foundation on the applications of economics in our society that leads well into the start of the HSC course.

This week the Society & Culture students made their way to a workshop to assist them in the development of their Personal Interest Projects (PIPs). The PIP is the major work all students must complete for their HSC, making up 40% of their final examination mark. This course allowed the students to get additional insight into how to commence their planning, undertake their research and develop their final submission. With such an uninhibited range of potential research topics they can undertake, this day provided the students with the direction and focus to begin their challenging and exciting projects.

And at assembly this week, the top performing students in the ASX Schools Sharemarket Game received certificates for their gains over the 3-month period. Megan Moshovelis from Year 9 placed first in the school with a return of 4.5% over the period. Tim Brand of Year 12 placed second with a gain of 3.4% with Kleo Rivera of Year 11 in third place making 3.35%. Well done to all Commerce, Economics and Business Studies students for participating in the game and learning the potential joy and despair of investing. This experience has certainly given them more insight into potential future investment decisions, whilst enjoying a bit of fun competition with their friends in the process.

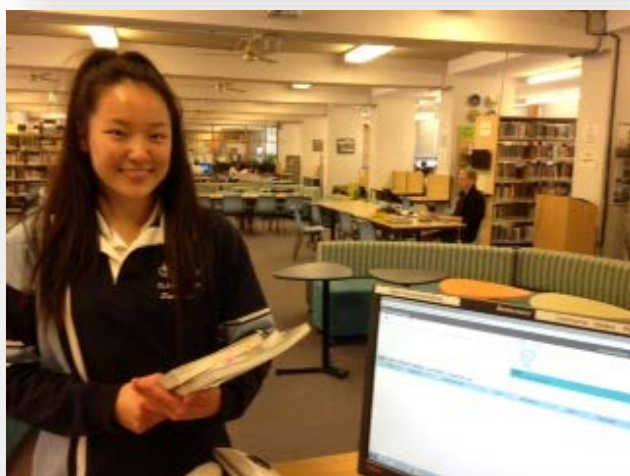
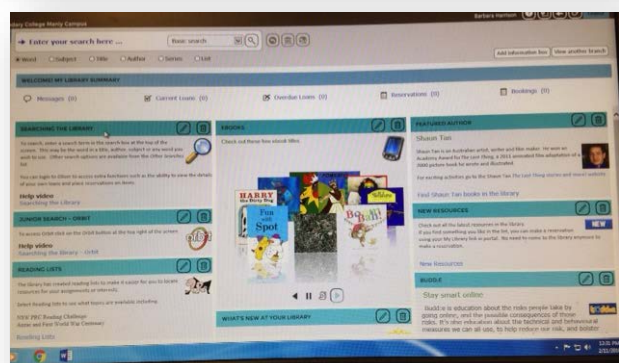
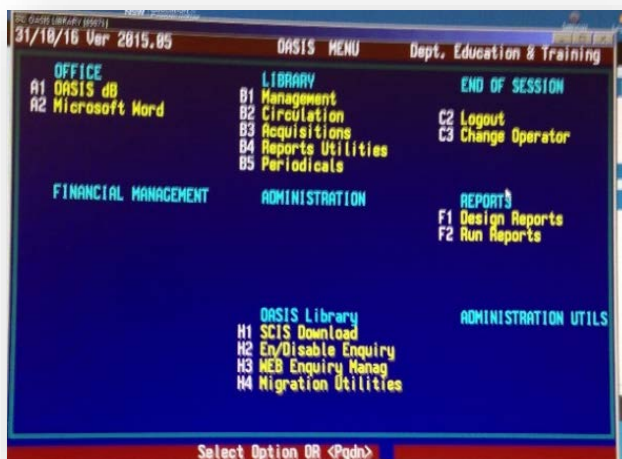
Library Technology News

FROM THE ARCHIVES

Continuing our articles from the 1974 edition of the Pines magazine, it is thought-provoking to read the library report. As we contemplate the requirements for our own forthcoming library extension and refurbishment, it is interesting to read what was considered state-of-the art 42 years ago, and to wonder what the future will hold in store in another four decades.

FROM THE LIBRARY (report by T. Hobbs):

This has been the first year of 'flexible programing' in the library. The intention is to make the library available for more people than the old timetabled arrangement, and in theory, many classes will be booked in for guided study in the library's free periods each week. Such periods of purposeful individual or group study are obviously an opportunity for real education to take place.

The library area is, of course, far too small for a school with the numbers we have. Thus, while on the one hand I regret that teachers do not book their classes to study in the library nearly as often as I would wish, on the other it is obvious that if teachers in all subject tried to organise their groups to use the reading room fully, there would not be space for them to do so, even once a fortnight.

Videotape has increased a great deal during 1974 and even with the annexe occupied most of the day, we quite often need to use the small recording room for a group to watch a program.

All these factors raise the question of what sort of library the school should be planning for the future. Ideally a large building with classroom, reading rooms and an audio-visual area, with greatly expanded technical materials would be desirable.

A highlight was our visit to Hurlstone Agricultural High School, a departmental school like our own, where all the facilities mentioned in the preceding paragraph are provided for fewer than 800 students. Libraries like this are gradually being built, but we may wait many years. Meanwhile we the students who should be able to use them.

I am obliged to point out these inadequacies, but in many ways the library is fortunate.

Mr Outterside's understanding of its needs and problems and his immediate response whenever action can bring improvement has been most encouraging. Mrs Jones keeps the audio-visual program going with enthusiasm and skill and she and Mrs West make day to day organisation pleasant and efficient. The student librarians are all alert and helpful under the guidance of P Massey, 6th form, our invaluable head library prefect.

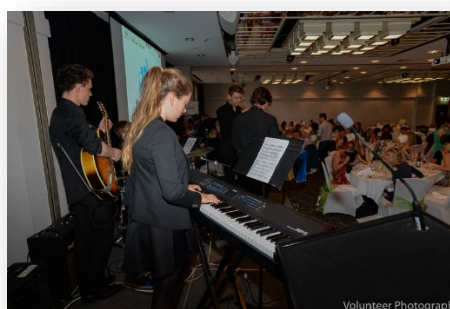
Helping with some of the tasks involved in band events is a very *rewarding and fun* way of being involved in your child's school, meeting other parents and getting to know your child's peers.
