In Week 3 students and parents attended the Year 11 Parent-Information night, where valuable information was provided by Mrs Whalan, Mrs Rixon and Ms Campbell-Allen on assessment policies and procedures and the support networks available to students. On this night students and parents were provided with a copy of the assessment policy and procedure booklet as well as a wellbeing support booklet. Students have started taking advantage of their free study periods during the day and the late afternoon opening hours of the library to form study groups and utilise their time effectively to revise and prepare for assessments and exams. The library is open until 5:30pm on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons and a light and healthy afternoon tea is provided to Years 11 and 12.



Last week, Year 11 embarked on their first Crossroads activity by attending Urban Challenge. The day started early with students eagerly asking questions to try and find out what was installed for them during the day. They were placed into their groups, reminded of their individual roles, given their first clue and set off on the Manly Ferry to



seek their next clue and instructions. Throughout the day, groups were challenged with having to navigate their way around the city with no google maps or internet to help them. Students explored Circular Quay, Observatory Hill, Pyrmont, The Rocks and Darling Harbour. ## Year 9 Forensic Science

Watch out criminals, Year 9 are now on the case! As part of the Science Faculties' Forensic Project, Year 9 had an opportunity to develop their chemistry and deductive skills during an incursion on Thursday.

The initial part of the incursion involved students being presented with a scenario where a murder had taken place. They were then presented with evidence including DNA analysis, ballistics and handwriting evidence. From these, they were able to determine who had committed the murder.

The final part of the incursion had a more practical angle, with all Year 9 students working in the Science labs, analysing a vast array of different chemicals. From determining which pen had been used to write an assignment all the way to what chemicals a urine sample contained, the students have now had hands-on experience as Forensic scientists.

The Forensic project will now enter the next phase, where students will be given another scenario and evidence associated with the case. They will have more time to examine this in-depth and will be presenting their findings to a "jury". This project has many of the students as well as the teacher very excited.

Thanks to Margaret Taylor and Meredith Legg for all their hard work associated with this project.

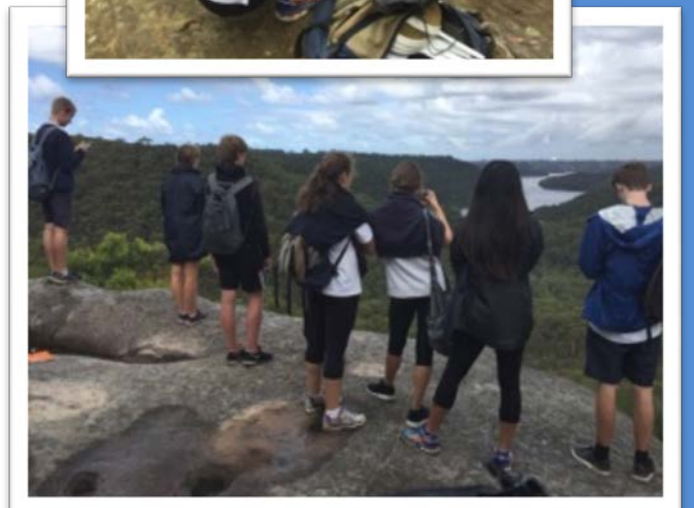

## HSIE Report

Concluding several weeks of excursions in HSIE, on Monday Year 11 Geography students went to Bantry Bay to investigate biophysical interactions within an ecosystem. They compared the health of two creek lines at Bantry Bay, examining how the development affects water quality. Through abiotic and biotic testing the students were able to determine life presence in the water and gauge the level of pollution in the creeks, and apply their understanding of the concepts in class through fieldwork experience.

Then to round off the term, on Thursday this week a number of students ran the ANZAC Day assembly to contemplate the significance of the Great War and all wars since on Australia. The reflections of each of the students were poignant, ensuring that the historical significance of these events are not lost over time.
