Knowledge Dispels Fear

On Friday 26 October, I had the pleasure of accompanying Year 10 to the Invictus Games. Introduced in 2014, these games were developed by Prince Harry, Duke of Sussex, as a way of healing and restoring hope to our wounded, injured or sick armed service veterans. During our visit we were privileged to hear from two of these returned servicemen and former Invictus competitors telling the story of their service and the impact of their injuries physical, psychological and social.

The veterans invited the students to ask questions and encouraged them not to be shy or reserved. One student asked the simple, yet powerful question; 'what was it you were most scared of'? In response to this, Darren Robinson, who had served as a peacekeeper in East Timor stated that 'coming home was the most scary experience'; being taken out of the context that he has been trained to deal with. Darren explained how military service involves intensive preparation to perform a very unique and specific job: 'when our natural tendency is to run from bullets, we are trained to run towards them'. He stated that their training was so thorough, that in most cases they knew exactly what to do in response to a critical situation. Darren stated that the only time he felt scared serving was when the outcome was uncertain, despite the training. Returning home was not part of this training, it's not part of the job description – there was no longer a set plan to respond to the challenges of day to day life. On top of processing difficult memories and experiences, this shift in thinking is what many veterans describe in their challenging experiences of PTSD.

Hopefully, most of us will be lucky enough not to experience the horrors of war; but it doesn't mean we will not be faced with fear or anxiety about unknown outcomes. Perhaps we can take note of Darren's mantra that he learned when he was training with the paratroopers; *'knowledge dispels fear'*. Whilst we are not necessarily having to *'run towards the bullets'* we can take every opportunity presented to us to improve our knowledge and deepen our understanding. This will help us to prepare ourselves for the challenges that life will

inevitably put before us.

Outside School

On Friday 2 December, Mrs Colby attended the annual Careers Advisor's Association conference and amongst many interesting workshops, there was one given by **Dr Jae Yup Jared Jung, UNSW.** Here are some of the key insights from his presentation on Careers Decision Making for GAT students:

- There is a perception in the community that GATS can do any career and don't need careers support – this is incorrect! GATS demonstrated distinct unique patterns when making careers decisions and require close guidance.
- It is imperative to synthesise an assessment of both interests and ability with GATS because of their multi-potentiality.
- Those students with unhealthy perfectionism will aim to find the "perfect career" (it does not exist)
- Expectations of others is greater on GATS pressures from parents, teachers, peers, media to live up to their potential and gain an intellectually stimulating, high paying job that will make a real difference in society.
- Gender role expectations a 2018 study showed GATS are STILL generally encouraged to pursue careers that are stereotypically associated with traditional genders (boys – engineering, medicine, architecture / girls – teaching, pharmacy, nursing) However, GATS girls are more likely to cross over.

- GATS students generally have a superior access to careers information and are thus, more knowledgeable about the opportunities, but need help and support in making this happen and in ensuring these goals are realistic.
- GATS tend to have an earlier emergence of interest in careers.
- Generally, GATS students are less imaginative in their career aspirations, opting for the traditional roles of health, communications, law, engineering, technology and physical science (investigative, scholarly work) and less likely to explore entrepreneurial or social careers.
- The future world of work fewer labour intensive jobs, emergence of new complex roles, increasing globalisation, fewer permanent roles. This world suits GATS with their ability to be lifelong learners but need to consciously take greater responsibility and keep networking to maximise their employability.
