HSC Trials

Year 12 written Trial HSC examinations start this coming Monday 5 August and will continue until Week 4, Friday 16 August. We wish all students well as they prepare for and complete their final school based assessment. Write a Book in a Day

On Monday, I had the pleasure of supervising 35 Year 8 students who participated in *The Write a Book in a Day* competition. Budding authors were given only 12 hours to write, edit, illustrate, review and print a 4,000-5,000 word novel suitable for children aged 10-16 years. Completed books are presented to children in hospital and all funds raised go directly to the Kids Cancer Project, a charity supporting childhood cancer research.

From the Deputies

The importance of taking time for reflection and evaluation.

At the beginning of a new semester, Term 3 is a good time for students to reflect on their performance to date and celebrate their achievements. Recently in pastoral care, students were allocated time to reflect on their Semester 1 report. One focus of this session was: *Did I achieve my semester one goals?* — in areas such as school and learning, home and study as well as maintaining a balanced lifestyle.

In this period of reflection and evaluation it is also time to reset your SMART goals for Semester 2. Students in Stage 4 will be taking on new subjects and meeting new teachers. They will be facing new challenges and have the opportunity to achieve in new areas. Questions all students may focus on are; how can I change my choices to get more value from my efforts? By being more positive and in control in my thinking will this assist me to achieve my goals? By staying focused on what's happening in the present and with a positive mindset, not only will you feel more invigorated, but your brain will be functioning at a higher level, allowing you to perform at your best.

As part of the wellbeing program at school there are many programs where students are given the opportunity to chat with teachers about their Semester 2 goals and aspirations e.g. the Term 3 individual student interviews; Year 11 (week 3 and 4) and Year 10 (week 6). Plus the Year 12 mentoring program. Latter in Term 4 we have the Year 10 learning portfolio.

Returning to the importance of reflecting and evaluation, students should also be mindful of celebrating their successes. Acknowledge the improvements you are making in your studies, be proud of the way you have overcome challenges and built on your ability to be resilient.

Year 11 First Aid

Year 11 PDHPE completed a First Aid course on Tuesday in Week 2. All students were successful in obtaining their First Aid – HLTAID003 qualification. Students learnt how to identify and respond to a variety emergency situations. As part of the course they learn how to provide CPR to an adult and baby, give an auto injector to someone having an anaphylactic reaction, help to administer medication to someone having an asthma attack and treat other medical conditions. Additionally, they learnt how to stop bleeding, manage cuts; hard and soft tissue injuries; bites and stings; concussion; stroke and shock. Finally, students developed a deep understanding of the moral and legal implications to providing first aid to a person.

Student Reports

Year 9 International Studies

The below student report is on the aid organisation Care Australia for a class task for the Human Rights topic.

CARE Australia - Every day, millions of people live in poverty, without the basic needs most Australians take for granted. Some have always lived this way, and some are struggling after a major disaster, but every day, CARE Australia helps these people in need, by providing them with fresh water, nutritious food, healthcare and education. CARE Australia mainly focuses on women, particularly as women are often subjected to worse living standards in developing countries. The organisation sends relief to 75 countries globally, and supports them in crises such as natural disasters.

CARE Australia was founded in 1987 when it joined CARE International (Cooperative for Assistance and Relief Everywhere) as a national member. The international humanitarian aid organisation was founded in 1945 when 22 organisations joined an effort to deliver care packages to World War II survivors. They now deliver emergency relief to those devastated by natural disasters, conflict, poverty, and those without the basic human rights. They have established global long-term development projects. CARE Australia was established by former Prime Minister Malcolm Fraser who was passionate about and determined to fight against global poverty and social injustice. He led it until 2002, also serving as the President of CARE International from 1990 to 1995.

One of their recent projects involved the Mozambique cyclone (Idai) in Africa, of which there were over 600 casualties, and thousands more whose homes were destroyed. CARE Australia is helping to aid those affected, by providing tents, food, and water purification tablets.

But it still isn't enough. Millions of people are still in poverty, and you can help.

You can support CARE Australia by donating or fundraising, participating in marches and advocating for the issues they strive to solve. You can also involve yourself in relief efforts and take part in fundraising challenges to help those in need experience what we take for granted.

With less than an hour left to go, year 8 finally started uploading their books. 1 team had uploaded, then 2, 3, 4, and 5. The last book was still left to be uploaded. With 5 seconds left before 8pm, we smashed the upload button.

It was finally over! 35 students had successfully written and illustrated 6 books in ONE day. I can guarantee that every student was relieved that we could finally sleep.

The next day, nine students went to Brookvale Public School. We followed this presentation by working with the students in closer groups, each year eight talking to a team and planning with an example parameters sheet.



Year 12 Book Club Review

Our latest read in the Year 12 book club has been *The*Strange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde by Robert Louis

Stevenson. This fascinating read is the perfect book to dive into on a sluggish winter's day, allowing yourself to get lost in the gothic novella that explores the



duality of the human psyche. Published in 1886, this classic has been adapted into Broadway musicals, films and graphic novels, and the term "Jekyll and Hyde" has become synonymous for a person possessing both good and evil personalities. Ultimately, the novel encourages readers to consider the philosophical question, "Are good and evil two unavoidable halves of the human identity that are fundamental in creating a whole being?"

The novel is a great companion read for lovers of Mary Shelley's *Frankenstein* as both texts explore *Worlds of Upheaval* through contextual examination of the age of scientific discovery, while combining an atmosphere of thriller and horror to represent the fears towards humanity shifting due to social and political change - integral qualities of modern literature.

The Year 12 book club will continue this term with discussions about *Life of Pi* by Yann Martel, the original magical-realism adventure novel that the 2012 Academy Award winning film, of the same title, was based on.
