## SWAT Workshop

Last week 65 new Student Wellbeing Advocates were trained to become part of the Manly Campus Student Wellbeing Advocate Team (SWAT). The aim of SWAT is to encourage young people to identify their strengths and to empower them to become champions for change to help strengthen student wellbeing in the school community.





The World Health Organisation defines positive wellbeing as:-

A state in which every individual realizes his or her own potential, can cope with the normal stresses of life, can work productively and fruitfully, and is able to make a contribution to her or his community.

The SWAs were introduced to this idea of wellbeing, which we boiled down to: -

*Positive wellbeing is the ability to respond to challenges.* 

The roles and responsibilities of the SWAT were discussed and summarised as this:-

To actively advocate for student wellbeing and help create a school environment that fosters a positive and productive state of mind, allowing students to respond to the challenges of everyday life, enjoy respectful relationships, engage in lifelong learning, benefit from opportunities and contribute productively to society. The SWAs role is to support the development of positive wellbeing strategies in the school that help young people to maintain positive wellbeing and resilience. The SWA's were reminded of the central tenants of the *Five Ways to Wellbeing, Choice* 

Theory and Growth Mindset as part of a 'Wellbeing Toolkit' that can help our young people keep their wellbeing in good working order.





In Term 4 last year, our Year 12 SWAT Elders had a brainstorming session whereby they decided upon the focus of this 2020's PC – **Sustainability** in each of our unique environments - **physical, social,** 

emotional and academic. After the summer of bush fires we have just had, this focus is more relevant than ever, as we look at ways in which we can create a sustainable future in all realms of our lives. The new SWAT members went through the Term 1 2020 PC program adding their own spin onto the sessions that promote the Keep Learning, Take Notice and Be Active aspects of the Five Ways to Wellbeing. Towards the end of this term, the SWAT members will come together again to help create some Connect and Take Notice interactive activities that create connection and cohesion between the various year groups in each PC classes.

With top tips on how to lead and engage their PC classes enthusiastically and respectfully.

I look forward to seeing their innovative, insightful approach to giving their experience and wellbeing interest, a voice, as they become change makers in student wellbeing.

## Year 12 PDHPE Sport Science Excursion

Year 12 PDHPE went to the Narrabeen Academy of Sport on Tuesday 25 February to enhance their knowledge of sport science and gain first hand practical experience of the processes that Elite athletes often go through. Students participated in and witnessed the use of VO2max testing as well as strength and power testing. They also got to use the training facilities to experience the different training strategies used to improve athlete performance. Following all their hard physical work in the testing and training strategies the students then went in the pool and, hot and cold water baths to experience recover strategies used by athletes. An added bonus to the day was being able to observe the Manly Sea Eagles completing a training session as part of their pre-season periodisation program.

- That longshore drift has been the reason the lagoon's entrance has been closing and leading to flooding - *Balin*
- The management strategies, e.g. seawalls, sandbags, beach nourishment *Catherine*
- That Collaroy/Narrabeen has a predominant northerly longshore drift. This caused the original beach to be formed, but now leads to severe erosion at the south end of Collaroy. As the sand blocks the lake, it can cause flooding and so it is dredged every 4 years. However as sea levels rise the time between dredging will decrease - Logan
- The atmosphere, hydrosphere and biosphere of Collaroy Beach – Aidan

#### **Student Report**

For my final two years of high school, I attended NBSC Manly Campus as a cross campus student studying Design and Technology, completing a major design project that was due in Term 3.

Whilst the major work increased my workload during school term, it was a highly rewarding experience that taught me some valuable lessons I can apply, now having left school, including the importance of time management. Following my time and action plan was crucial as well as not only relying on class time to develop aspects of the major project. Certain parts, such as the folio and research had to also be completed outside of school hours.

During the experimentation phase, prototyping was vital as my initial design idea changed considerably, adding more technology and refining the design as directed by experts from surf lifesaving. The project also taught me to use my resources including my teacher, Mr Forsyth, who helped in the development of the project and read through many versions of my folio, giving me valuable direction and advice to improve.



After the project was marked, I was selected to have my project displayed in the Powerhouse Museum for the Shape exhibition. I am incredibly privileged to have my major work be one of 35 works displayed.

It was an amazing experience attending the presentation and witnessing the diverse range of technology projects selected from across NSW. Ultimately, I am grateful for studying design and technology, and for the support of my teacher and classmates.

## **NBSC Students in Borneo**

The below article and photos have been extracted from the NBSC media release 'NBSC students make a difference in Borneo'



21 students from NBSC ventured to Borneo on a humanitarian trip during their 2019 and 2020 Summer Holidays.

- 21 dedicated students from all five campuses of NBSC dedicated their time to fundraising and planning their trip from the Northern Beaches to Borneo as part of the Duke of Edinburgh award.
- Students spent 3 weeks immersed in Malaysian culture in the communities of Tinangol, Bongkud and Batu Puteh.
- A fun and enjoyable atmosphere was cultivated by the students whilst engaging in their humanitarian projects.
- The projects involved: mixing and laying concrete, building retaining walls and drains by the side of the road.
- Planting trees in the dense jungle along the Kinabatangan river to ensure the Orangutan population is preserved.
- Speaking and teaching young children English in small communities. Supporting the local economy through daily snack purchases at the local shop.
- Playing football and volleyball with the local teenage community among the foothills of Mount Kinabulu Trekking over 5-days through the muddy Malaysian jungle and setting up camp in challenging conditions.

- Students visited the incredibly moving Sandakan memorial site for the 800 POW soldiers who perished in the Death March toward the end of the World War II. The Sandakan Death Marches were a series of forced marches in Borneo from Sandakan to Ranau which resulted in the deaths of 2,434 Australian and British prisoners of war held captive by the Empire of Japan during the Pacific campaign of World War II in the Sandakan POW Camp. 6 soldiers survived, all Australian. The Sandakan 'Death March' remains the greatest single atrocity committed against Australians in war.
- The team left a positive mark everywhere they traveled. Well regarded by local staff for their commitment to all elements of the expedition.
- Smiling, happy, but tired travelers returned to Australia just one week before school returned after an experience of a lifetime.
