SRC Planning Day

This month the SRC got together and had a planning day, hosted by Narrabeen Surf Life Saving Club. It was a super fun day packed with activities, discussion and of course, games. We prepped for all the amazing events Manly will be having this year, such as Pinestock. We started brainstorming and organising various new student led initiatives, which included the new flagpole, a revamping of the SRC notice board (located in the canteen with information regarding our meeting, upcoming events and a suggestion box), a new mural, another energy audit (to make our school more environmentally friendly), and raising awareness of ways to combat melanoma. Overall, it was a productive, eventful and information filled day.

Year 8 SRC Sun Safety Initiative

Year 8 SRC is working on a new idea to combat melanoma, the deadliest type of skin cancer. It's a terrible disease but hugely preventable. Melanoma is the second most common type of cancer diagnosed in 15 to 19 yet 90% of cases can be successfully treated if detected early. 'Slip, Slop, Slap, Seek, Slide' is the most effective way of preventing all skin cancers which has driven our new plan. This involves installing another sunscreen dispenser, creating more shaded areas, implementing a different hat into the school uniform and raising awareness through the PDHPE department and the SRC. Jared Colyer (Year 12 2020) designed a bucket hat for his Year 10 ILP project and we're seeing if it's possible to implement this design. Another idea involves working with the P&C on their plan to create a shaded area over the ping pong tables.

Night of Stars

As many of you know, our annual school talent show Night of Stars was held Friday Week 6, and what a night it was. We had many high quality performers spanning across the years with lots of variety from bands to singers to pianists and even to a slam poetry performance by Esther. As our first Night of Stars held in the school hall in three years, and with COVID restrictions still present, we were nervous at how it would go, but in hindsight there was no reason for worry as the evening went as well as we could hope, with only a couple of technical mis-haps.

This was a charity event with all proceeds going to the Starlight Foundation, a non-profit organisation that supports children in hospitals, providing workshops and care. The night was highly successful, earning over \$1500 dollars profit.

Day 1: Today was a calm day with minimal wind and a rising tide, thus we had a water current helping us move forward, however, it was minimal. The only fauna we saw was several species of water birds in the distance and jellyfish in the river. Various non-outback unique Australian plants were seen along either riverbank. The kayaks we used were great on the river, however, due to the low height of the kayaks we did have problems with passing ships leaving waves in their wake which did swamp our boats a bit. However, we were provided with a sponge which was guite useful for getting rid of water which did get into the boats. A highlight of the day was the arrival on Bar Island cemetery where we were treated to an impromptu history lesson. We learned how and when the church and cemetery was built, and how the orange orchard on the island was one of the first in Sydney, and how if you came to the island during Autumn and Winter you may get ripe oranges to picked and eaten. When we eventually got to the camp site, we were quite happy since we got there an hour ahead of schedule where the campsite was quite good, we even had a table there. Eventually Keith came around on his boat and

delivered to us the 6 20L Jerry Cans of freshwater to us. After this we setup our tents and decided to go for a swim in Marramurra Creek which was next to the campsite.



Day 2: Today was forecast to be a hot day, upwards of 35 °C, so we aimed to leave camp early and make use of the cooler morning temperature. We packed up our tents but left the kayaks and tried to leave as minimal of a trace as possible. We headed west along a track that took us through the valley to the base of one of the ridges. On the way we spotted a red belly black snake slithering along the path and into the tall grass that grew on either side. We made our way up a steep fire trail that flattened out along the ridge. We stopped for a bite to eat before heading off the track for some bush bashing. We made it to Checkpoint 10 relatively quickly, with minimal damage to people and equipment, and so decided to continue to Checkpoint 8 as we didn't want to walk along the unprotected fire trail in the heat of the afternoon. However, the dense bush made for a tough hike and by the time we stopped for lunch, the group was very tired. Along the way we saw many spiders and native plants. We decided to bush bash our way down the slope to camp, and although it seemed like the best decision at the time, it ended up taking around 6 hours. We cliffed out multiple times and a twisted ankle sustained by a group member slowed our progress down. We stopped in a cave while we waited out a short storm and made

our way to the river before returning to camp just after sundown. The general mood seemed to be tired and unhappy, but glad that we had done it and it was now over. We set up our tents in the



little light we had, and had some much-needed water from the jerry cans.

Day 3: Today was a calm sunny day like the previous days except slightly cooler with a little to no wind and a rising tide. As such we had a water current going against us which made it harder, however, unlike Day 1 the tide was coming in faster so we had more difficulties. The only fauna we saw was still only the same several species of water birds in the distance and jellyfish in the river along with the same various nonoutback unique Australian plants were seen along either river bank since we were just doing Day 1, but reversed. Unlike Day 1, the river traffic was great this time with many waves from passing boats affecting our going as we were swamped a lot and somehow there were waves that we had to manage around the wide parts of the river. The kayaks we used were still going great, however, we really did get swamped a lot as some of the waves we had to go through to keep moving towards Mooney Mooney was taller than our boat, with us coping with the waves by turning into them at an angle to try to rise up the waves instead of cutting our way through them. A highlight of the day was the arrival at Mooney Mooney where we finished the entire Journey after 3 days of travel. We were all exhilarated and happy it was over.

The trip was quite enjoyable except that Day 2 was partially difficult with the descent and, since we ran out of water halfway down, it is probably the only part of the hike that I did not like. Some of the most memorable events would be the Day 2 descent from the ridge, it was tedious and difficult. It was a good thing the group worked well together since we had a person who was injured, and we didn't know which way to go to move down from the ridge. To be honest my proudest achievement with this pack and paddle would be finishing it so that my DoE Silver is now complete. The things I think I

should've done differently would be to bring more water on the hike and to not bring as much food since I ate a lot less than I thought I would.
