Principal's Report

Semester 1 Reports

The Semester 1 reports are due to be distributed soon. You will be provided with the information on your child's progress towards the achievement of academic outcomes in each subject. Furthermore, teachers will provide feedback on your child's approach to their learning through their demonstration of the *Manly Learner Attributes.*

At NBSC Manly Campus, through the Manly Learner Portfolios, we encourage our students to selfreflect on their demonstration of the *Manly Learner Attributes* aligned to the school values of *Academic Excellence, Personal Best* and *Giving Back* to the Community. We have been working towards more accurate ways of aligning our student reports with these self-assessments.

In the current reporting period, Year 11 and 12 will continue with previous proficiency reporting in these areas using the existing scale of *Consistently* through to *Rarely*. However, you will notice a change in the Year 7 – 10 reports, as we have developed a rubric for teachers to measure students' demonstration of their progress towards the attributes. Teachers will be referring to the attribute definitions and demonstration criteria in the rubric to determine each student's current position in the continuum, with each faculty identifying and reporting on attributes relevant to their course.

For your reference, a copy of the rubric is on the next page of this newsletter. The criteria demonstrates each Learner Attribute at progressive levels 1 to 4. It is important to note it is expected that students will not always be achieving at the higher levels in an attribute, especially in the early stages of their secondary schooling.

The purpose of the rubric is to provide a clear indication of each students' areas of strength and areas for focus and improvement. A student is not considered to be underachieving if they are not working at the higher levels in an attribute. Demonstrated levels of *Manly Learner Attributes* will no longer be used in the determination of Year 7 to 10 Principals Awards. These awards will now be purely focused on achievement of academic outcomes. Students demonstrating excellent progress towards *Manly Learner Attributes* will be recognised through the Year Adviser Awards.

Please take time to review the rubrics and school report with your child, as their consistent application and progression in achieving these learning attributes is integral to empowering their success as learners.




Our First Nations students have been taking part in 'Sky Symposium', a two-day workshop for First Nations students from all NSW selective schools to come together for a series of engaging cultural and academic opportunities. They participated in a range of activities such as looking at the physics of boomerang throwing from Uncle Les, and investigated mathematical modelling around moieties with Professor Chris Matthews, Chair of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Mathematics Alliance (ATSIMA). Teachers at NBSC Manly Campus have been continuing to share ideas on how to reconciliate in the classroom. We have been focusing on improving cultural safety, which includes strategies such as integrating authentic (First Nations) perspectives such as authors/ musicians/ artists/ scientists. Reconciliation week provides an opportunity for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, and actively be a voice for reconciliation throughout our day-to-day lives.



Our fabulous librarian Allison has compiled an <u>updated list of fiction and non-fiction</u> written by mob. I can highly recommend a couple on this list, and I'm looking forward to reading a few more

through the holidays. 'Bila Yarrudhanggalangdhuray' by Anita Heiss is a fabulous, fresh perspective on the Gundagai floods of 1852 and she integrates Waradjuri language into her story telling in a way that reminds me that I still have so much to learn.





Year 9 have heard from guest speakers from 'Bush to Bowl' in Geography, and the Design & Technology class has been investigating and comparing traditional methods of transport with current technology. Year 10 Commerce has been looking into ethical business practice and the importance of supporting authentic First Nations artists and merchandise. There are lots of interesting things being learned across the school, hopefully your child is bringing some of the stories to the dinner table to share.



From 2nd to the 4th of May, the Department of Education held the 'Sky Story Symposium' which was the first ever camp for First Nations Selective School students from across NSW, at Sydney's Land's Edge Foundation.



Over the course of the camp, we had the amazing opportunity of connecting with like-minded individuals from places such as Wollongong and Armidale on the commonality of our culture and heritage. We were able to connect with country, elders and each other through bush walks, canoeing, cultural and art workshops. We also had the awesome experience of listening to university talks and hearing about pathways for First Nations students, a tour of the University of Sydney, and engaged in an Acknowledgment of Country workshop to better understand the meaning of our people, which all helped better equip us with skills and knowledge for our future. The theme of the camp was "my culture, my future, my way" and it really helped us understand who we want to be and what we want to become as First Nations students in our world. This was an absolutely amazing opportunity and I hope to do it again in the future.

Year 7 History Incursion

Student Report

On Monday 15 May, Year 7 attended an HSIE incursion run by Archaeologists from Macquarie University about Ancient Greece.

The incursion included an expansive variety of interactive and informative tasks within 4 periods, each touching a different aspect of Ancient Greece and archaeology, and each with a different mentor to bring fresh perspectives.

The university also provided a hands-on experience and we did lots of different activities throughout the day. Some examples of these include: piecing together pottery, trying on armour and weapons from Ancient Greece, digging through sand to find non-organic and organic items, inspecting bones to determine whether a body was female or male, and looking through different items that someone from Ancient Greece would have owned to figure out their social status and occupation. For the activity based on battle and warfare, students learnt about war strategies and different battles between the city states as well as, ancient Greek armour and weaponry. Students were given replicas that we were able to wield. I was lucky enough to be chosen to hold a sword that hoplites (Ancient Greek foot soldiers) would have used thousands of years ago and it's safe to say this activity was my favourite.

Our minds were further opened to how Ancient Greeks experienced everyday life thousands of years ago. We got to see many pictures and learnt about how to properly dig up an archaeological site. From this we learnt about the archaeological site tied to the Temple of Hera.

Further, another session taught students different techniques used to decipher when and where an artefact is from. Personally, this incursion was a great insight into what archaeology is like and inspired me to learn more. I believe that everyone benefited from this day and am very thankful that Macquarie University decided to come to our school. Students gained lots of skills and knowledge from this Incursion and we look forward to furthering our abilities during HSIE this term.
