English Extension 2 Go to Sydney University

We were even able to hear advice from the soothing voice of renowned author Anna Funder. We learned about the importance of (and how to) research, pondered upon various literary forms, learned how to please a tired marker (and what to avoid), how to approach our assessments and more.

We got a taste of life at university, exploring nearby treats and transportation, and (I believe I speak for the class here) left with a better idea of which foot to walk on to start our Major Work.

Year 7 Go on a Hero's Quest

Term 4 is a great time in the Year 7 English classroom. The weather is warmer, essays have been completed and the hero's quest gets underway.

7ENO recently spent time outdoors, applying their knowledge of Joseph Campbell's theory of the 'monomyth' of the hero's quest in human history and storytelling. Students worked in teams to map the structure and archetypal characters using chalk to visually represent their ideas. Each team had to translate the plot of JRR Tolkien's "The Lord of Rings", "The Fellowship of the Ring" to "Campbell's Circular Structure", showing critical and creative thinking in

considering Frodo's characterisation and the shadow and shapeshifter archetypes he meets along the way. Well done to the two winning teams in showing detail, creativity and accuracy in Tolkien's narrative.

The four classes have also been learning to analyse the visual language of cinema through viewing classic hero's journey films such as "The Lion", "The Witch and Wardrobe", "Paddington 2" and the Japanese anime classic, "Spirited Away".

Year 8 Meet "The Bard"

Year 8 students have immersed themselves in all things Shakespeare this term in English and undertaken a literary adventure back to the 16th century. Each class has studied "The Bard's Life" and works to develop skills in understanding our shared cultural heritage through the world's most famous playwright. In Week 5, professional actors from the Bell Shakespeare Company ran a series of interactive workshops for each class. Over two hours, students performed Shakespearean lines from his most famous plays, gained a deeper understanding of the actor's role in bringing a character to life and enjoyed the popular insults activity.

The Year 8 Bell Shakespeare incursion in Week 5 was fascinating, entertaining, and very informative too.

The person who came in for the program was very enthusiastic and encouraging and made the experience enjoyable.



We started by talking about what we already knew about Shakespeare, and the important influences in his life, as well as listing the plays he wrote. We then did engaging drama activities, including acting based on a word or phrase in Shakespeare's language, working on non-verbal communication by miming an idea in groups, and practicing our Shakespearian insults.

My favourite activity was when we had to point to someone and say "You!", in a tone of either hatred or love, and then the person would respond, "Me?". Overall, the experience was enjoyable, and I learned a lot about the language and ideas of Shakespeare.

Year 9 Get Poetic

This term in English Year 9 has been working on complex themes and ideas found in conflict poetry. In our class we closely examined poetry techniques and structural elements using Wilfred Owen's "Dulce et Decorum est", along with "Anthem for Doomed Youth".

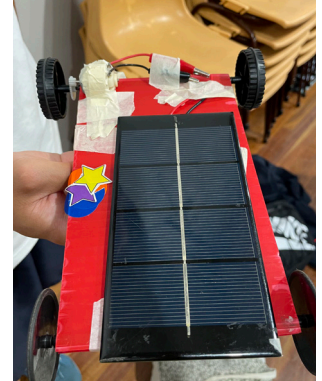
We then worked on the task of crafting our own nuanced adaptations of W.H. Auden's "September 1, 1939," drawing inspiration from its language and literary devices. As part of our exploration of war poetry, we listened to and dissected the Vietnam War song "I Was Only 19" by Redgum, which we then placed in contrast to the hip-hop version, gaining ideas for our own poems. Despite initially appearing impossible, we successfully formed intricate and meaningful reverse poems centered around our chosen conflicts.

To cap off the unit, we delved further into conflict poetry, conducting research and in-depth analysis of additional works. With these insights in hand, we worked to create our own individual poems, skillfully incorporating all the techniques and knowledge we acquired over the course of this term.

Science – Solar Car Race

What makes for an exciting physics and engineering lesson? An intensely competitive solar car race.



In Week 5 Year 10 students built their own versions of UNSW SunSwift (world champion and record holding solar car) in an incursion put on by UNSW School of Photovoltaic and renewable energy engineering.

After a round robin and semifinals playoff the eventual winners were Vernon and Darien, with close runners up Pahandee and Megan. Win or lose, the students had a great time collaborating to assemble the kits without instructions, thinking creatively about factors such as number of motors, gears, wheel size and type, tilt angle of the panels and structural stability.

UNSW also gave a talk to our next generation of innovation leaders about the future of, and potential careers, in renewable energy.

Schools Constitutional Convention

Student Report

On Friday the 3 November 2023, I had the wonderful opportunity to attend the NSW Schools' Constitutional Convention, which was held in NSW Parliament.

This year's question was "Do we need to revise constitutional change", for which participants were required to write a paragraph answering the question.

Upon arriving at NSW Parliament, participants were ushered into the legislative assembly to hear the keynote address by Professor Anne Twomey, who is a constitutional lawyer and professor at the University of Sydney. She gave an amazing speech on the usefulness of constitutional conventions, with specific reference to the recent Voice referendum, as well as the issues with our current referendum system. After the speech, we were split into groups of around 12 to discuss this year's question in detail. It was a delightful experience to discuss important issues with bright students from across the state, who brought up interesting ideas to improve our current referendum system, which included the introduction of constitutional conventions prior to referendums across states to reflect Australians' values.

We finished off the day with a presentation of the summary of ideas brought up by each group and left with a pocket edition of the Australian Constitution as a souvenir from the day.

Overall, it was an incredible experience to engage with students from across NSW and engage in interesting discussions around the issues with our current constitution amendment process.

To conclude, I, on behalf of the Semester 2 Food Technology students, would like to wholeheartedly thank Ms Pereira, our Food Technology teacher, for providing amazing support and guidance along the way, as well as to the awesome kitchen assistants for providing help on the day and all the food practical's leading up to the big day.

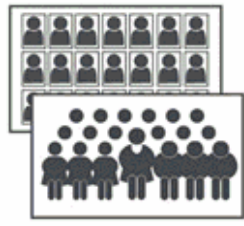

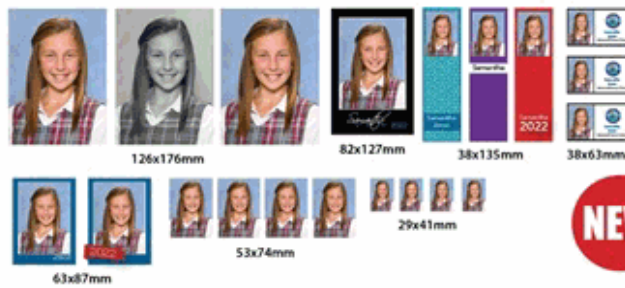

STEP 1

Go to www.advancedlife.com.au on your computer, phone or tablet.

STEP 2

Enter your school code:

in the 'order and download' box. This will take you to your school's secure online ordering site.



STEP 3

Click on 'Order Photos' and complete your details and procedures. During this process you can place orders for additional children at your school and sibling photos, if available.



cash/envelope ordering

Your school prefers orders to be placed online. However, if you are unable to order online, please complete your order using the order envelope provided.

STEP 1

Complete a separate order envelope for each individual child's package/s ordered. If ordering for more than one child, payment should be enclosed in the envelope of the eldest child and this should be indicated on the envelope of the other child/children (the envelope that does not have cash enclosed).

STEP 2

Enclose exact cash payment in one envelope for the package/s you are ordering. Payment for more than one child should be in the eldest child's envelope and marked at the bottom of the envelope in the space provided.

STEP 3

Return your completed envelope/s, with correct cash payment, to our photographers on the day.

Please note: You must enclose exact correct payment, as change is not available. Credit card payments can only be made online and we no longer accept cheques. There is a separate envelope for sibling photo orders, should your school choose to offer sibling photos.

School photographs will be returned approximately 6 weeks after the day of photography.

Please note this delivery timeframe is dependant on proofing and additional photography days at your school.

IMPORTANT - "not for publication" students

If you have instructed your school that your child's image is "not for publication" (sometimes called "do not publish" or "not for media release" instructions), the school will ensure that your child is not presented to our photographers on photo day and school photographs will not be available for purchase. If you wish to change your instruction, then you must notify your school, so they change their records and identify your child as able to be photographed for school photography purposes. All students presented to our photographers by your school on photo day will be photographed, their images will appear in school photography packages with their fellow students and these packages will be available to purchase by all families.
